Covers basic concepts and issues such as:

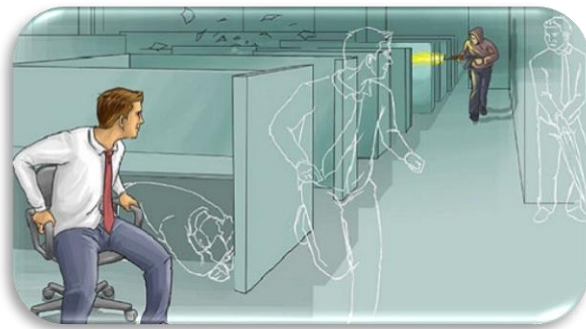
The world today: A look at changing worldviews and attitudes
